Lightning Apologetics

Apologetics 101

Greetings in Christ! This is more of a personal note than an apologetics article. I want to share something with you that I experienced about two weeks ago in the hopes that it might help you in the same situation. These are just some observations and some possible solutions offered at the end.

When I was at a PJ's Coffee shop, I just happen to overhear a conversation. I was not trying to eavesdrop but was one of those situations where one could not but hear them as they were speaking right at the next table. These two ladies were speaking with one another. They were talking about Faith issues. One was an Evangelical Protestant lady as she was very zealous and literate in her conversation and often quoted the Scriptures. She was very enthusiastic about her congregation. She was bragging about the congregations youth minister and how wonderful he was. She spoke of his wife and how she was pregnant and how everyone just loved her. She was giving a full endorsement of her congregation. She spoke glowingly of all the Bible study in her church and many of the ministries and was trying to get this Catholic lady involved in one of those ministries. If this lady was selling insurance she would be fantastic at it! You'd want to buy insurance from her.

The Catholic lady was buying what she was saying. She liked what she heard and she wanted to be part of it. She realized as a Catholic that she (sadly) was not equipped to know who God is, nor was she able to comment on any of Sacred Scripture. This lady didn't have the skills the Protestant lady had, but she was hungry for them, and here was a lady who had a way to feed her.

The conversation then switched over to the Evangelical lady. She mentioned that she had gone to a Catholic Church once and was told she could not receive Holy Communion. She said no one explained to her why should could not receive Holy Communion. She became embarrassed and felt bad. They did tell her she could cross her arms and go up to receive a blessing. She then stated that she felt uncomfortable because she felt they were all brothers and sisters in Christ, so why discriminate on who could receive or not receive.

So, here we have a person who is very excited about her Protestant and Evangelical congregation! She was zealous! It made me think, how many of us are excited about our local Catholic parish? Would you be willing to sit down at a coffee table for thirty-forty minutes boasting and bragging about how awesome your parish is? Could you talk about the sacredness of the Mass or an inspiring homily? How many of us would be zealous about our parish? Could we point out the great ministries and bible studies in our parish? Can you see where I am going with this?

So we also have a Catholic lady in this situation who wants to grow and learn and has met another woman who could show her how to do that. Sometimes we Catholics need to be like that Protestant lady, NOT in her theology, but in her zeal and enthusiasm and willingness to teach people the Catholic faith and to show people After all, Christ Himself founded our Church! We have the fullness of truth! We should be on fire for the Faith!

A few things come to mind about all this. When it comes to the Holy Eucharist and our Catholic Mass, if we have someone with us who is not Catholic and is attending Mass with us, we need to explain the Mass and Eucharist and be willing to explain why they cannot receive Holy Communion, yet encourage them at the same time to be blessed and to look at the parishes apostolates and that they are welcome to look into those apostolates or events going on in the parish.

Think about it. We Catholics are profound. We have a deep theology. We have a deep end in our pool so to speak but we don't often have a shallow end of the pool for people to join us. Sometimes we might take people to the high dive and just say "jump in." There needs to be a shallow end of the pool where people can inquire. Yes, we do have RCIA, but how many even know what that means? Do non-Catholics know what that it means Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults? I would say very few. What does RCIA mean to those who don't know diddly about the Catholic faith? Nothing. We do need to be more welcoming with people desiring to know more because we are supposed to go out "into the whole world and teach everything that I have commanded you." We should not be losing people like this dear Catholic lady who wants to go deep, but finds it outside the Catholic Church. Since it was a private conversation, I did not want to say much and get into a debate in front of this poor lady, so I handed the Catholic lady my parish business card and just offered to help her with any questions she may have about the Church at any time. I handed the other lady my card and kindly said that if she ever wanted to discover the truths of the Catholic faith, I would be at her disposal. Nothing more. No argument, no Scriptural verse ping-pong game.

This is why I am beginning this year a program called "Why?" It will be an introductory course (only three weeks of looking into Why God? Why Christ? Why the Church?) Each class only forty-five minutes long. It will truly be an introductory class. If you have anyone who has questions on the Church, wants to know more, or just wants to inquire, stay tuned.
